- b. Can you consider Browning's "Fra Lippo Lippi" as the poet's own understanding of the reationship among art, artist and the society? How does he explore the Renaissance spirit in Lippo Lippi as an artist? Discuss.
- c. How does TS Eliot take help of different Western and Indian classics in order to understand the spiritual lack within the modern civilisation in his The Waste Land? Discuss.
- d. Explore the significance of the church in the poem "Church Going" by Philip Larkin.

## 2. Answer any three of the following questions:

a. Don't you notice that Hopkins as a poet exhibits certain tedencies much different from his Victorian contemporaries? On what grounds can he be considered as a modern poet? Discuss with reference to his poems.

- b. How does Eliot's Prufrock portray the tragic predicament of the modern man? Explain with textual illustrations.
- c. Explore the sense of social responsibility on the part of the poet as expressed in Matthew Arnold's "Dover Beach".
- d. On what way does the physical act of 'digging' transcends the mere literary meaning in Seamus Heaney's poem "Digging"? Explore the socio-cultural and psychological connotation of the term.
